As part of the event I shared a short presentation on Rotary hoping those in earshot would leave knowing more about us. I think it's worth repeating as the President's Message this week. Hopefully, there are some sound bites that you can use as you tell your own Rotary Story.

### Light Up Rotary 110<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Presentation

Our 1.2 million member organization started with the vision of one man Paul P. Harris in 1905. Paul was a Chicago attorney who formed one of the world's first service organizations, The Rotary Club of Chicago. It was a place where professionals with diverse backgrounds could exchange ideas and form meaningful, lifelong friendships. Rotary's name came from the group's early practice of rotating meetings among the offices of each member. Amazing how Paul's idea flourished and in less than 16 years Rotary had clubs on six continents. Today we have over 34,000 clubs and we are on every continent. We're truly international. The heart of Rotary is its dedicated people who share a passion for both community service and friendship. Rotarians are neighbors, friends and community leaders around the globe. We bring together great minds who share diverse perspectives, share the conversation, and take action on the world's most pressing challenges. We make a difference at home and abroad.

So you are asking what does Rotary support? There are six avenues of service --we promote peace, fight disease, provide clean water, save mothers and children, support education and help grow the local economies. Our global partners include the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, Centers for Disease control and Prevention, Global FoodBanking Network, Mercy Ships, ShelterBox, UNICEF, United Nations and the World Health Organization. We have a shared respect. For example not only are we celebrating our 110th Anniversary we are also celebrating 30 years of our effort to eradicate Polio. We are close to ending this horrible disease with only 3 countries showing active cases this year down from 125 in 1988 and in the last 2 weeks there have been no cases reported. "We are this close."

We are so pleased that you are here to help us Light Up Rotary in Alpharetta Georgia. We ask each of you to take a candle as you leave and remember, "It is better to light one small candle than to curse the darkness." Speaker this Week - Dr. Marshall Shepherd -Zombies, Cola, and Cereal: Implications for Communicating Weather and Climate.

Dr. J. Marshall Shepherd is a leading international expert in weather and climate. Dr. Shepherd was the 2013 President of American Meteorological Society (AMS), the nation's largest

and oldest professional/science society in the atmospheric and related sciences. He is the Georgia Athletic Association Distinguished Professor of Geography and Atmospheric Sciences. Dr. Shepherd is also the host of The Weather Channel's Sunday talk show Weather Geeks, a pioneering Sunday talk show on national television dedicated to science, and he serves on the Earth Science Subcommittee of the NASA Advisory Council.

Dr. Shepherd is frequently sought as an expert on weather, climate, and remote sensing. In February 2013, Dr. Shepherd briefed the U.S. Senate on climate change and extreme weather. He routinely appears on CBS Face The Nation, NOVA, The Today Show, CNN, Fox News, The Weather Channel and several others. His TedX Atlanta Talk on "Slaying Climate Zombies" is highly regarded and cited.

Dr. Shepherd received his B.S., M.S. and PhD in physical meteorology from Florida State University. He was the first African American to receive a PhD from the Florida State University Department of Meteorology, one of the nation's oldest and respected. Dr. Shepherd is the author of forthcoming textbook, The Urban Climate System, and co-authored a children's book on weather and weather instruments called Dr. Fred's Weather Watch. Dr. Shepherd is

originally from Canton, Georgia. He is married to Ayana Shepherd and has two kids, Anderson and Arissa.


